

Bikes, Brews, Breads – Creston's Main St. captures new investments with clear Vision

Change happens organically it is said. Businesses locate in neighborhood business districts for a host of different reasons. And, since 2006, CNA's vigorous organizing work done around our local Main St. has been a key of those organic ingredients making change happen!

Last July for the first time since the 2012 creation of the North Quarter Corridor Improvement District there was money in the bank and the tax increment financing dollars were made available to the group.

These monies allowed the group to contract with CNA and our executive director for a year of quarter time corridor management in 2015-16. Volunteers on the North Quarter committees stepped up and created a bike rack program with a logo to market the area this with installations spring of 2017.

The engagement of our business owners is tremendous as they have committed over these years to doing the heavy lifting involved with creating our 2015 North Quarter vision for "an engaged and dynamic community that honors heritage and innovation with a variety of services, entertainment and housing to welcome neighbors and visitors."

This variety of services is here. New retailers include bike shops, massage therapy, hair salons, arts and crafts, an art gallery, brewery, coffee shop, architects, a bridal shop, a skate shop, a brewery and in 2017 two Cheshire area restaurant/cafes with exciting new menu offerings. Market rate housing developers also plan to break ground in the coming year.

The leadership of the North Quarter CID and the Creston Cheshire and Monroe North Business Districts is committed to this vision. We honor the contributions of former marketing director for CarStar Collision, Laurie Williams. for years of service given to planning and organizing the Creston Car Show, serving on the board of the Creston Business Association and North Quarter CID. Inspired by her example, we will offer a fresh new event highlighting our proximity to area parks and our new identity as a bicycle friendly "adventure district" on May 20 2017. The North Quarter plans a family friendly Tour de Quarter. Volunteer or join us in the activities including a bike parade and scavenger hunt.

A single mother needs help mowing her lawn, a man hurt his back and needs help shoveling his driveway, a retiree on a tight budget needs services she can't afford when going to a professional landscaping and snow removal company.

Whatever the reason, people are looking for help from their neighbors, and whether you are a teenager looking for some after -school income, or just someone with a little extra time and energy, you may be just the person they need!

Last year, CNA worked to pair residents in need with nearby neighbors willing to assist. To be ready for the snow-shoveling season already upon us, we would like to expand this resource list – as we currently have more neighbors looking for help than volunteers to fill those needs.

If you would like to help your neighbors in need, and have the time and energy to do so free of charge, contact CNA!

If you or your child or your brother or whoever you may

know is in need of a little supplemental income, we can pair them with a neighbor who is willing and able to pay for those services.

Conversely, if you or a family member or neighbor needs help raking, shoveling, or mowing – either because of shortterm or long-term circumstances – sign up for our program, and let us know if you can afford to pay the teen around the corner for helping you out, or if you need help on a strictly volunteer basis.

If we can harness the power of volunteers throughout the span of our neighborhood, we are reaching our goal – saving money for our economically disadvantaged

neighbors, keeping sidewalks and driveways clear for our children walking to school, and our yards looking nice and cared for.

Hank Swart Jr., lifetime musician and volunteer organizer of the Aberdeen Celebration in the Park and Calder City Band leader passed away at the age of 93. His musicianship led to co-founding

the River City Jazz Ensemble, performing for 4 presidents and first ladies and all around Western MI. He was active with 2nd Congregational Church and with other neighbors organized Aberdeen Celebration for many years. For 31 years the NENA and the CNA neighborhood associations created and hosted this free family event which sparked a chain of progress and reinvestment for this park that continues to grow. Hank owned Northtown Hardware, next door to longtime family owned business Kay Pharmacy. Mike Koelzer, owner and pharmacist offers these thoughts about his friend: "Hank knew me before I even knew him. Owning the hardware store next to our pharmacy, there was never a time when I did not know him. After the hardware closed years ago, Hank came to work part time at the pharmacy. He's been a daily part of my life. Through the years, Hank would tell me I was special to him and he loved me, and I would say the same to him. I miss him."

Local History

In 1880, a 14-year old wood carver Boudewyn DeKorne, moved with his family from Netherlands to Zeeland.

According to a history of the company "He quickly established a reputation in the area for his intricate carvings and was soon working as a Master Carver, producing hand-made wood furniture for the prestigious Berkey & Gay Furniture factory in Grand Rapids."

Sometime in the early 1900s he went into business for himself producing hand-carvings and furniture for homes, churches and libraries, both locally and throughout the US.

1916, Boudewyn's son, Lewis, began to work in his father's Ottawa Avenue shop.

It was sometime around this time that they began using the name DeKorne Furniture Company. They eventually moved the business to 1504 Plainfield, and in 1929 built a new store there.




The DeKorne Furniture Building looks little different today than it did in 1934 when this photo was taken. The building is now home to the new Creston Brewery.

This store stayed open for the next 66 years.

Lewis' son Jack joined in 1946 and in the same year added a relatively new, quality line of furniture from Vermont called Ethan Allen, and this brand eventually became the company's exclusive product line.

Lewis retired in 1962. In 1965


Jack DeKorne retired in 1991, after which the company was owned and operated by his sons David and Dale.

David and Dale sold the retail portion of the business to Ethan Allen in 2005. The name De-Korne Furniture Company lives on today, but only as a legal entity.
